This identified a number of areas for improvement to ensure provision matches current needs. Two stood out as requiring capital investment, Foundry College where an increased number of permanently Schools excluded children has meant the current premises are unfit for purpose and the Little Acorns unit at Wescott Infant school, where increased complexity of need has meant the current premises are too small. These proposals have been discussed with the schools during 2017 and early 2018. The Review and questionnaire were wide ranging (ie extended beyond the SPCF brief), but the accompanying email explicitly stated that the review formed the basis for our proposed SPCF programme, and the questionnaire included the Foundry and Wescott schemes.
